How are school districts able to fund capital projects?

- Annual School Budget
- Bond Referendum



There are limits to what and how many capital projects an annual school budget can support.

For example, in this year's, 2022-2023, School Budget, 2 million dollars, funded from capital reserves, were allocated for capital improvements.

Are there any <u>disadvantages</u> to funding most capital projects in the annual school budget?

YES! There is a BIG disadvantage...

NO STATE AID!!!



Capital projects funded through a bond referendum are eligible for up to 34% state aid

For example:

This summer, air conditioning was installed in the South Gym at Wall High School. The project was funded by the annual budget and it cost \$621,000

If this HVAC project had been funded through a bond referendum...

The state aid estimate would have been \$211,140; therefore, the project would have cost Wall Township taxpayers \$409,860!



On a project costing \$621,000,
State pays \$211,140
District pays \$409,860



What is a bond referendum?

A referendum is a vote, and a bond referendum asks voters to approve funding through the sale of bonds. These bonds can provide the school district with upfront funding to make long-lasting improvements similar to the way a homeowner might use a loan to renovate a kitchen. Property taxes are used to buy back those bonds, with interest.

Important to know...

School districts -- via a referendum -- require voter approval to sell bonds to raise funds for capital improvements.



With that in mind...

The Board of Education approved holding a referendum on December 13, 2022



The referendum philosophy:

Question #1: Needed projects that will result in **no increase** in debt service taxes

Question #2: Needed projects that will result in some increase to debt service taxes



How can Question #1 be accomplished without an increase in taxes?

Wall Twp. Schools has debt from the last referendum coming off the books.

NO tax increase (Tax Neutral)

Question #1 asks the voters for \$53,078,733

State contribution: \$18,046,792



How much will Question #2 cost?

Question #2 asks for \$13,520,475.

State contribution for Question #2 is \$2,009,806



How would both questions impact our taxpayers?

Question #1:

No impact (replaces the debt coming off of the books)

Question #2:

Impact on average assessed home (Est.\$483,357) will be approximately \$60.00 per year/\$5.00 per month
